1. About the Clean Air Zone

A major source of pollution is road traffic, particularly diesel engines. Air pollution affects everyone in Bristol, especially in the most polluted areas of the city.

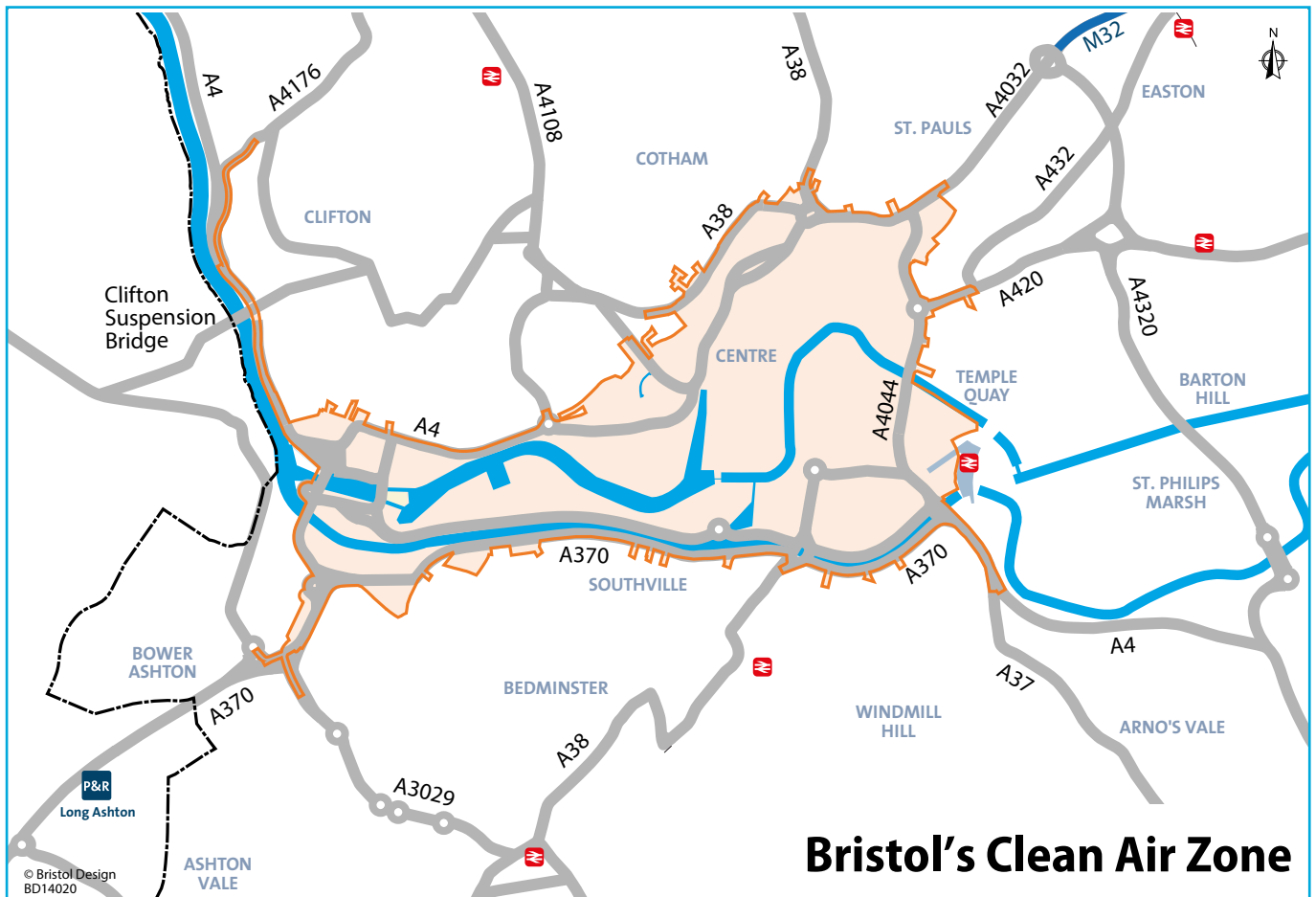
The council has a legal and moral duty to reduce pollution in the shortest possible time. The government has directed Bristol and other cities to do this through a Clean Air Zone.

Bristol’s Clean Air Zone will come into operation in late summer 2022.

No vehicle is banned from driving in the zone, but the most polluting vehicles will have to pay a daily charge to travel within the area.

Unlike a congestion charge, which charges all vehicles to enter the area, only the most polluting vehicles are charged to drive within the Clean Air Zone. The majority of vehicles that travel in Bristol already meet the zone’s emission standards and will not be charged.

The zone will also encourage more people to switch to alternative ways of travelling, such as public transport, walking and cycling.



Location

The zone is designed to improve air quality in the central area where it's worst.

By encouraging people to switch to cleaner vehicles or change the way they travel, the zone will improve the air quality throughout the city and not just in the zone.

We also estimate the zone will reduce the traffic travelling into the city by approximately 1,500 vehicles per day.

Clean Air Zone standards

Only vehicles which do not meet the emission standards for the zone will be charged.

71 per cent of vehicles travelling into the zone already meet the emission standards so only a minority of vehicles will be charged.

DIESEL:

Euro 6 (VI) standard or better (most new registrations after 1 September 2015)



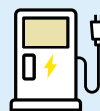
PETROL OR LPG:

(Added to original petrol engine)
Euro 4 standard or better (most new registrations after 1 September 2006)



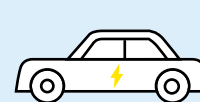
GAS:

Euro 6 (VI) standard or better



FULLY ELECTRIC:

(Or hydrogen fuel cell)
all are compliant and avoid CAZ charges










HYBRID ELECTRIC:

Diesel engine must be Euro 6, petrol engine must be at least Euro 4

Charges

If your vehicle doesn't meet the zone's emission standards you will have to pay a daily charge to drive into it.

Vehicle type	Charge
 Private car	£9 per day
 Taxis	£9 per day
 Vans	£9 per day
 Heavy goods vehicle	£100 per day
 Buses	£100 per day
 Coach	£100 per day
 Motorcycle	No charge

There's only one charge per 24 hour period (midnight to midnight). The zone will operate 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Vehicles entering the zone will be picked up by automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) cameras.

If you live within the zone and drive a vehicle that doesn't meet the zone's emission standards, you will only be charged if you make a journey.

How to pay

Once the zone is operating, charges must be paid via the [government's online payment system](#) or by calling their Clean Air Zone Support Centre on 0300 029 8888 (8am to 4:30pm).

Please note you will **not** receive written notification or an alert when you have entered the zone and a payment is due. You are fully responsible for managing all payments.

You can pay the charge to enter Bristol's Clean Air Zone from **up to six days before until six days after you enter the zone**. If you do not pay the charge before the end of this window you may be issued with a Penalty Charge Notice of £120 (which is reduced to £60 if you pay it within 14 days).

Exemptions

You may be able to apply for an exemption from Bristol's Clean Air Zone charge if you meet our eligibility criteria and own a vehicle that doesn't meet the zone's emission standards. There are temporary exemptions for Bristol's Clean Air Zone and national exemptions for all Clean Air Zones.

2. Get ready for the Clean Air Zone

Review your fleet

It is important that businesses and organisations review their vehicles before the zone is introduced.

Take advantage of financial support

The council recognises that smaller businesses and people who are self-employed may need extra support to prepare for the zone.

We want to help businesses grow and prosper. Funding is available to help you prepare for the zone in various ways.

Funding will be open to all businesses that operate within the zone. Initially we will be prioritising small or medium sized enterprises, sole traders and charities.

Funding for small or medium enterprises (SMEs)

Heavy Duty Vehicle Fund

SMEs with coaches or heavy goods vehicles may be eligible to apply for support through the Heavy Duty Vehicle Fund.

This can help with the cost of retrofitting vehicles which do not meet the zone's emission standards and purchasing or leasing compliant vehicles. To find more visit [our website](#)

Support for individuals travelling into the zone for work

If you're travelling into the zone for work in a non-compliant vehicle and earning less than £26,000 a year, and no more than £13.51 per hour, you may be eligible for an exemption until the end of 2022.

Invest in cleaner vehicles

If your vehicles meet the emission standards for the zone, you won't be charged for driving in the zone.

You may want to consider updating your fleet to save money and reduce your emissions.

As well as improving air quality and helping to combat climate change, choosing a low or zero emission vehicle can also save you money.

Whilst the upfront costs may currently be slightly more than for a petrol or diesel vehicle, the running costs of these newer technologies are lower. This helps owners make significant annual savings and means that over time the total cost of owning a low or zero emission vehicle (including purchase price) is often cheaper.

Car clubs

Car clubs offer an alternative to private car ownership for individuals and businesses. They reduce the need for private parking and can help more people give up their cars while allowing for occasional car travel.

Review staff travel policies

Supporting and encouraging your staff to use active and sustainable travel options (such as walking, cycling and public transport) makes good business sense. It can help save money on Clean Air Zone charges and parking fees as well as have a positive impact on air quality, health, wellbeing and corporate social responsibility goals.

Why not consider:

- staff salary sacrifice car scheme and bicycle schemes
- provision of pool cars / car clubs and pool bikes
- reviewing business travel policies
- encouraging staff to visit the [Travelwest website](#) for information on public transport, cycling and walking options for any journey

Implementing flexible working or home working policies may also benefit your business, your staff and the environment.

Travel audit
